The Assam Official Language Act (ALA) which was passed the same year granted Assamese the status of the sole official language of the state. Given Assam’s historically multilingual character, the ALA only added to the often violent communal clashes between the Assamese, whose population rose by almost 150 per cent following the Census of 1951, and the non-Assamese speakers.

In Assam, state Legislative Assembly passed a resolution by which Assamese was made as the official language of state. This led to an agitation in the state by Bengalis settled there, who wanted that Bengala should also be made official language.

Problem Created by Language in Indian Politics

Bodo is an ancient language of Assam. Spatial distribution patterns of the ethno-cultural groups, cultural traits and the phenomenon of naming all the major rivers in the North East Region with Bodo-Kachari words (e.g. Dihing, Dibru, Dihong, D/Tista, and Dikrai) reveal that it was the most important language in ancient times. Bodo is now spoken largely in the Western Assam (BTAD).

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In Assam, the updation of NRC could not be carried out since 1951 due to several political compulsions.
