The Rambam wrote (Hilkhos Teshuva 2:7), "Yom Kippur is the time for individual and communal Teshuva... Therefore, everyone is required to do teshuva and recite viduy on Yom Kippur." Thus, although the Rambam does not consider teshuva a mitzva generally, an obligation of teshuva does apply on Yom Kippur.
