Few wives and daughters of the Regency era inherited real property (land, houses, and the like) because the inheritance laws were stacked against them. Men won the inheritance game during Jane Austen's day (and for many decades afterward). Nonetheless, some women did inherit real property.

In Regency times people did not wash themselves frequently, and petticoats and chemises presented a barrier between unwashed and sweaty skin and the dress. Since undergarments were made of sturdier fabrics, they could be laundered more often. In addition, people with less means owned fewer gowns and employed fewer servants to do the laundering.

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
